To Score or Not to Score

I'd suggest not keeping score until you are ready. As a beginner, the score is unimportant. Focus on taking a good swing and hitting solid shots. There is no reason to put pressure on yourself to try and make low scores right from the start.

Focus on working on your golf swing and your short game. Learn to hit the ball well and get off each green after just a few putts. When you can do this consistently, you are very likely ready to start keeping score.

If you want to challenge yourself before you are ready to keep score, you can do things like keep track of fairway hits, try to get through nine holes without losing a golf ball, or not take over three putts on each green.

From the Grounds Crew

I'm not sure if any of you have noticed but it is a little dry out there. I have been having flashbacks to the summer of 2012 when we set both heat and drought records and the crew spent all summer hand-watering areas where we don't have irrigation as well as trees. I am hopeful that we will not get to that point this summer but with the weather lately you just never know.

The warm, dry conditions we are dealing with cause us to do things a little differently around the course. The main thing we do is water, a lot. The warm, dry air is making it difficult to keep up with the irrigation. During a "normal" weather pattern I might water certain areas 2-3 times per week and that is more than enough. This year there have been stretches where I am watering every night and it isn't close to being sufficient. We end up putting out additional water during the day as well as running hoses and portable sprinklers where we can. It also becomes quickly apparent if a sprinkler is malfunctioning or simply not covering the area it should be. We have spent a lot of time chasing dry spots due to the irrigation system not performing the way we would like. The height of the cut has been slightly raised to help it withstand the additional stress, and we are not mowing the unirrigated areas unless needed.

There are a couple of things you can do to help during this time of additional stress:

- Please understand that it will be necessary for us to run water during the day. With our irrigation system and grasses, we are not able to just water during the overnight hours, especially on fairways.
- Do not drive on dry burnt-out spots. Keep your cart where the grass is still green and growing.
- Most importantly, keep carts away from tees and greens and make sure all four of your tires are on the path. I have noticed way too many carts off the paths and near the greens. I understand if you have a flag in your cart and cannot walk well but most of the "violators" appear to be ablebodied younger golfers that need to keep their carts on the paths.

Enjoy the summer and see you on the course.

Never take a cart onto someone's property and please stay off property that has been clearly marked by the homeowner as "no trespassing".




150-Yard Poles
